A-1	<p>Your AAPPL Interpersonal Interaction score of A-1 means that you participate fully in the conversation. You can communicate with ease and confidence on topics of general interest and some new topics related to concrete social, academic, or work-related areas. You can narrate and describe in all major time frames, and you can efficiently deal with an unexpected turn of events, resolving a problem you might encounter in your daily life or while traveling abroad. You sign in well-formed paragraphs that show organization, cohesion, and detail. You are understood by people who use this language.</p>	<p>Continue developing your skills in narration and expanding your ability to engage with topics beyond the general and personal level. Consider exploring information or watching videos to help you practice conversations on those topics, supporting your own opinions, discussing issues from an abstract perspective or hypothesizing.</p>
I-5	<p>Your AAPPL Interpersonal Interaction score of I-5 means that you keep the conversation going by asking questions, telling stories, describing people, places, and things, and reporting events. You can sign about some topics beyond yourself. You can also resolve a problem that you might encounter in your daily life. You sign in well-connected sentences and some paragraphs. You sign in a way that people who use this language can understand you most of the time.</p>	<p>Practice signing more complete stories about things that happened, are happening, or will happen. Describe things in a way that helps the viewer form a clear mental picture of what you are signing. Practice adding detail every time you can. Report and discuss events beyond your immediate environment. Try imagining a problem and proposing a range of possible solutions.</p>
I-4	<p>Your AAPPL Interpersonal Interaction score of I-4 means that you keep the conversations going about yourself and your life by asking questions, describing or signing stories. You easily use your language to express your own thoughts. You can get the things that you need or want, even if it requires extra effort. You sign in well-connected sentences. You sign in a way that your teacher and others who are used to language learners readily understand. People who use this language understand what are expressing some of the time.</p>	<p>Practice signing stories from beginning to end. Once you've signed a story, go back and add something to each part of it to make it more complete. For example, describe everything you see in your class, neighborhood, or home, and then add more detail. Practice signing in conversations about topics beyond your immediate environment. Imagine a situation where you need to do or get something done, and a problem arises. Practice resolving the complication.</p>
I-3	<p>Your AAPPL Interpersonal Interaction score of I-3 means that you maintain conversations about yourself and your life. You also use your language to express your own thoughts and get the things that you need. You can connect some sentences together. You ask and answer a variety of questions. You sign in a way that your teacher and others who are used to language learners easily understand.</p>	<p>Practice adding words to be more specific in describing things (quality, quantity, size) or to help clarify when something happened or in what order. Think about how events unfold in a story and try to sign that sequence clearly. Use signs like "then," "so," "afterwards," and "finally" to organize the flow. Ask more specific questions to get more specific information from your signing partner.</p>

I-2	<p>Your AAPPL Interpersonal Interaction score of I-2 means that you can maintain a conversation about yourself and your life. You also use your language to express your own thoughts and get the things that you need. You can use more than one sentence at a time. You ask and answer questions. You sign in a way that your teacher and others who are used to language learners understand.</p>	<p>Practice connecting your ideas and putting sentences together by using signs like "but," "because," and "when." Practice asking questions in different ways to get more information. Keep adding new information and details to make your ideas more complete and clear. Express more about more topics</p>
I-1	<p>Your AAPPL Interpersonal Interaction score of I-1 means that you can have a conversation about yourself and your life. You can also use your language to express your own thoughts and get the things that you need. You tend to sign in simple or discrete sentences. You can ask and answer simple questions. You can sign in a way that your teacher and others who are used to language learners can understand.</p>	<p>Join as many conversations as you can, especially outside of class. Once you've answered a question, try to add something more (another fact, thought, or even another question) to keep the conversation going.</p>
N-4	<p>Your AAPPL Interpersonal Interaction score of N-4 means that you can have a conversation about yourself and your life. Much of the time you can also use your language to express your own thoughts and get the things that you need. You tend to sign in phrases and some sentences. You can often ask and answer simple questions. You can sign in a way that your teacher and others who are used to language learners can understand most of the time.</p>	<p>Keep the conversation going by asking follow-up questions on the same topic. Work with your partner to figure out what you don't understand and sign around words that you don't know. Keep expanding by expressing more about more topics. Imagine a situation where you need to get something or do something. Then practice how you would handle it.</p>
N-3	<p>Your AAPPL Interpersonal Interaction score of N-3 means that you can sign several things about yourself. You can list, name, and identify everyday things with signs, words, phrases, and occasional simple sentences. You can ask and answer some very common and familiar questions. You can sign in a way that your teacher and others who are used to language learners can mostly understand.</p>	<p>Practice having conversations. Start the conversation, keep it going, and then end it. Use questions to help move the conversations along. Practice signing as you can about yourself. Try to use as many sentences as you can.</p>
N-2	<p>Your AAPPL Interpersonal Interaction score of N-2 means that you can sign some things about yourself. You can list, name, and identify everyday things with signs, words, and phrases that you have learned. You can understand and answer some very common and familiar questions. You can sign in a way that your teacher and others who are used to language learners can understand much of what you are signing.</p>	<p>Practice asking more questions on more topics. Combine your words and phrases into simple sentences. Keep learning new signs!</p>
N-1	<p>Your AAPPL Interpersonal Interaction score of N-1 means that you can sign a few things about yourself. You can list, name, and identify common things with simple words. You can answer one or two basic kinds of questions that you have learned and practiced in class. You can sign in a way that your teachers and others who are used to language learners can understand some of what you are signing.</p>	<p>When you answer questions, try to use more than one word and even use a phrase. Keep building your skills by asking questions and using new signs.</p>
