Main ideas and supporting details are comprehensible with familiar situational subject matter containing high-frequency vocabulary and structures. Some new subject matter in areas of general interest will be generally understood.</p>	<p>Continue developing your skills by watching videos or viewing passages that include extended narration and more complex language on topics beyond the personal and general. Explore information or watch videos about community or world issues. Develop strategies to understand how others express and support their opinions. Practice strategies to understand the abstract treatment of topics and hypothetical discussions.</p>
I-5	<p>Your AAPPL Receptive Comprehension score of I-5 means that you fully understand with ease main ideas and supporting facts in short passages, simple narratives and descriptive passages on familiar topics. In addition, you can understand some more complex passages on less familiar topics. You may need to watch passages more than once. Your knowledge of the language, your ability to tell the difference between a main idea and a detail, and your ability to use context clues and inferencing may help you understand what you see.</p>	<p>Frequently watch longer passages, stories, and news reports on lots of different topics. Use the organization of the passage to help you view more efficiently. Pause frequently to check your understanding. Compare what you see to what you already know and to what you expected to find out. What do the details add up to? Do they give you any new understanding?</p>
I-4	<p>Your AAPPL Receptive Comprehension score of I-4 means that you fully understand main ideas and supporting facts in short passages, simple narratives and descriptive passages on familiar topics. You may need to watch complex passages more than once. Context clues or prior knowledge may help you understand what you see.</p>	<p>Frequently watch longer passages, stories, and news reports. To deepen your understanding, pay attention to how the passage is organized. Pause watching often, to check your understanding. Compare what you see to what you already know. How do the details add up? Did you gain any new understanding?</p>
I-3	<p>Your AAPPL Receptive Comprehension of I-3 means that you understand main ideas and supporting facts in short passages on familiar topics. You may need to watch complex passages more than once. Context clues or prior knowledge may help you understand what you <u>see</u>.</p>	<p>Frequently watch longer passages or simple stories. To deepen your understanding, start noticing how the content is organized. Compare what you see to what you already know.</p>

I-2	<p>Your AAPPL Receptive Comprehension score of I-2 means that you understand main ideas and supporting facts in short passages on familiar topics. You may need to watch the passage more than once. You may need context clues, additional cues, and prior knowledge to help you understand what you see.</p>	<p>Practice watching longer passages or simple stories. To deepen your understanding, start to observe how the passage is organized. Compare what you see to what you already know.</p>
I-1	<p>Your AAPPL Receptive Comprehension score of I-1 means that you likely understand the main idea and possibly some supporting facts in short passages on very familiar topics. You usually need to watch a passage more than once. You usually need context clues, additional cues, and prior knowledge to help you understand what you see.</p>	<p>Use what the passage presents about the topic to understand the main idea and look for some supporting facts. Try to use different strategies, such as looking for clues in familiar signs or words that you recognize. Use what you already know about a topic for additional clues about what the signer wants you to understand. Then go back and rewatch to get more information.</p>
N-4	<p>Your AAPPL Receptive Comprehension score of N-4 means that you likely understand the main idea in short passages on very familiar topics, but rarely the supporting facts. You usually need to watch the passage more than once. You may need additional cues such as pictures, your own knowledge of a topic, familiar signs, or words.</p>	<p>Use what the passage presents about the topic to understand the main idea and look for some supporting facts. Try different strategies for ways of understanding, like using clues from pictures, titles, familiar signs, or words. Use what you already know about a topic for additional clues about the topic. Then go back and rewatch to see what more you can understand.</p>
N-3	<p>Your AAPPL Receptive Comprehension of N-3 means that you understand signs, words, phrases, and occasional simple sentences. You may need to watch something more than once. You may need additional cues such as pictures, your own knowledge of a topic, familiar signs or words.</p>	<p>Use what the passage presents to understand the main idea. Try to use different strategies, like looking for clues in pictures, familiar signs or words that you recognize. Think about what you already know about a topic for additional clues about the topic. Then go back and rewatch to see what more you can understand.</p>
